BIBLE SCHOOL LESSON Sunday April 13, 1947

THE KINGDOM ESTABLISHED

(Bases of National Greatness)

Printed Text I Sam. 9:1, 2: 11:12. 12; 15:1, 22-26, 34, 35.

Today we begin a study of a series of twelve lessons, on the establishment, and history of the political life, of the nation of

No other nation had ever been so blessed of God. For over three hundred years, God had ruled His people through judges. He had always kept them from their enemies, as long as they served Him. Even when their disobedience caused Him to allow their enemies to overcome them, temporarily, He raised up leaders to deliver them, just as soon as they repented of their sins. But in spite of all this God given care, Israel was dissatisfied. They wanted a king "like the other nations." Human nature has not changed. We still want the things which we see those about us having, no matter how much better off we are with what we have.

Samuel, the last of the judges, was much distressed by this request of the people. He therefore made it a subject of fervent prayer, to God. But God told him that Israel was in reality rejecting Him, and not Samuel.

The first two verses, of the printed text, give us a description of their first king. He was the type of man the world wants. He was tall and handsome, and of striking appearance. A man who would be quite impressive, leading a royal procession, or at the head of his army.

Saul began his reign in a most praiseworthy manner. He was self effacing and as we see from verses twelve and thirteen, of chapter eleven, he was generous and for-giving, in his attitude toward those who did not share his own political views. We could wish that Saul had continued as he began. But this is not the way of mankind.. Authority and prestige soon began to inflate the ego of Saul.

Not satisfied with being the political ruler, he presumes to intrude into the priests office. This was, and still is, a grevious sin. God has separated the church and state. The church is under the Prince of Peace. The state is under the direction of the prince of

der the direction of the prince of this world, who is also "the prince of the power of the air." Saul realized his sin, but did not fully repent of it. However, God, in love, gave him another chance. There was a certain nation, the Amalekites, which had been a thorn, in the side of the nation of Israel, from the time when God had led them out of Egypt. Although Israel had done nothing hostile toward them, the Amalekites had dealt very treacherously with Israel. God had. that when therefore, decreed, Israel was established in the land, Palestine, the **Amalekites** should be utterly destroyed. This meant a complete annihilation, of every living thing, both man and beast. Samuel had relayed this command on to Saul. He in turn had started to carry out the order, but when he saw some fine cattle, he was too easily persuaded, by the people. Instead of completely destroying every person and thing, he spared the best, on the pretext of using the animals for sacrifices, to the Lord. He had also taken Agag, the king, alive and had brought him back with them. Samuel now reproaches Saul for his incomplete fulfillment of God's command. But instead of repentance, for his failure, Saul protests that he has carried out the Lord's command, because of the sacrifices which he has brought. Saul now realizes his sin, and begs Samuel to turn again with, because of the people, but Samuel refuses. Sad, indeed, is the end, which we find recorded in verses thirty-four and thirty-five. "And Samuel came no more to see Saul until the day of his death."

Saul learned, too late, that one may not presume upon the mercy of God, indefinitely. From this

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time forth, difficulties increase for him. Finally, in defeat, he attempts to take his own life, and comes to an inglorious end. What a climax to such an auspicious

beginning.

We shall "stand before the judgement seat of Christ" in due time. Let us, therefore, seek to "grow in grace and the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ," that we "may be found of Him in peace, without spot and blameless" at His coming.

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
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Mr. Frank Albert Green

Local historian, a school teacher in his youth, for many years sexton of Stow Cemetery, now a returned traveler from Florida (two week's vacation) here you see Mr. Frank Green in a rather thoughtful mood

as he was caught unawares one day last Fall by photographer Ray Hosfield.

It may be said that Mr. Green's avocation is local history, though as everyone who has read his recent article on the Jews (published in the C. C. News March 14th) will realize his interest is more than local. As he says "the general history of mankind" fascinates him. This we believe comes from his genuine liking for people.

Mr. Green was born in 1868. Because he has spent most of his life in Stow, mingling with its tradition and history, and working for its improvement it must be a slight disappointment that he wasn't born here. His parents with complete lack of foresight at the time of his birth were living in Canfield, Ohio where his father was preaching.

His mother, Ellen Stow Green, was a descendant of Joshua Stow, the founder of this township. His father, Reverend Francis M. Green was a Disciple minister, an author, editor and a Representative to the State Legislature.

Frank, who was an only son, was well cared for as a child by his four sisters, Lurie, who became Mrs. Edwin Wetmore of Stow; Fannie who was Mrs. William Cox of Cuyahoga Falls; Mary; and Daisy, Mrs. William Hillyard of Cleveland who is the only one still living.

Report has it that he was a typical preacher's son, but time tempered him and after completing his education at Hiram College and Ohio State University, he taught school in Stow until his deafness made it necessary for him to change his occupation.

For a number of years he lived with and cared for his aged grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Stow. He farmed their land on east Graham Road until they died at the respective ages of 99 and 96. They, incidentally lived to celebrate their 75th wedding anniversary.

At one time Frank worked as a metalurgist in Cleveland. In 1910 while working at Silver Lake Park, he met and married Minnie Geddie of Hudson, who is a native of Banbridge, Ireland. After living in Silver Lake for a time, they built their present home at 370 Hudson Road. They have three children, Frances who lives in Cuyahoga Falls; Elizabeth, Mrs. Austin Cowles of Stow; Robert who is living in Chiefland, Florida, and six grandchildren.

Frank's chief vocational interest in the last twenty years has been the care of the Stow cemetery, and its appearance always speaks well for his industry and skill. But he finds time for much reading and writing. History is his forte, and he has written much about local families and places.

His many friends everywhere and his accomplishments are apt proof that is is possible to live a good, full, and useful life in spite of physical handicaps.



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

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

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
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#### PASTURE

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
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#### I. NOBLE


