SERMON THE HIGH COST OF LOW LIVING

Man's economy is controlled by the law of give and take; so likewise is the economic law of God.

-we do and we receive.

"The Lord God took man and put him into the garden of Eden to dress it and keep it. And the Lord God commanded the man, saying, of every tree of the gardden thou mayest freely eat; but of the tree of knowledge of good and evil, thou shalt not eat of it."

The Lord made man in His own image and likeness. He created him so that me (God) might have a fit companion for fellowship and association. Adam was placed in the garden as an employee of God. He was to care for the garden of Eden-which was the tabernacle of God. He was to offer sacrifices, and make offerings of Thanksgiving to God. The time that Adam was placed in the garden was in some ways to be a time of probation, where in he would be tested concerning his obedience to his Creator. For his obedience he was allowed freedom of the tabernacle; for his disobedience, he would receive the reward of spiritual death and estrangement from God. You know the story—Adam failed in his testing and the Lord literally put him out of the garden.

I. Sin Is, Sin was the downfall of Adam. Adam had a special place in God's economy until Satan suggested that he sin. Thru the intelligence of Satan sin was committed. Man is not the originator of sin. He is only the tool of this worldly emissary of all evil.

Sin is responsible for much. It is responsible for a great change that encompassed the whole uni-verse and affected everything. There is nothing in the realm of material and even of spiritual things which are not affected by sin, nothing except the Trinity. Dr. Farrar, in speaking of the universality of sin said, "Sin and salvation both begin in Heaven

and come from Heaven to earth." The effect of Adam's sin was not alone born in his own nature. but his act of disobedience became the shame of Heaven itself, because it gave Satan access into the very Heavenlies. Job 1:6 "Now there was a day when the sons of God came to present themselves before the Lord, and Satan came also among them, the day that sin entered into the world and into Heaven the evil and the slander of the devil has been continuously opposing the work of the Lora. Satan was cast from Heaven then, and from that day to this has been going about as a "roaring lion seeking whom he may devour," as the Scriptures say.

Sin is responsible for the earth's being cursed. When sin came God gave thorns and weeds along with the fruit for the use of man. At the time of the original sin, God said to Adam, "Cursed is the ground for thy sake." I firmly believe that had not Adam sinned, man would never have had to turn his hand to produce the things which he needs to sustain

Sin is responsible for physical death. In the original plan of God there was to be no death, either physical of spiritual; but due to the fall of man, death came to the animal and human creation. Death was not a law of humanity, but death came by sin. "The wages of sin is death"—Romans 3:23. Sin brought about death in two aspects—physical and spiritual. Spiritual death is the condition of the soul without a God to give it life.

II. Sin is a State

Sin is a condition in the nature of man that never changes until God changes it. When Adam disobeyed God, God withdrew from his soul,—Satan came in, and has been in control ever since. It is true that God has decreed that Satan shall be punished for his crime of tempting Adam, but so also will Adam be punished for having yielded to that temptation. The evidence of this sinful state is everywhere. It is foolish to say

BIBLE SCHOOL LESSON Sunday, May 25, 1947 The Fall of the Northern Kingdom (Why Nations Perish)

Printed Text II Kings 17:5-12, 22, 23,; Isa. 28:1-4.

Since the Golden Text of this lesson is not a part of the printed text, it may be well for us to note it at the beginning. "For the Lord knoweth the way of the righteous: but the way of the ungodly shall perish." This verse, which is the last verse of the first Psalm, is a very definite warning against ungodliness, whether of individuals or nations. It had in all probability, been given at least two hundred and fifty years before the time of our lesson for today. But Israel had disobeyed Gods law and failed to heed this warning. The results of Israel's failure constitutes our lesson As we look about us today, is there any indication that this warning is being heard and heeded today?

Approximately fifty years pass between the lesson of last Sunday and that of today. Amos, the herdsman of Tekoa, whom the Lord called and sent to prophesy to the northern kingdom, has given God's message of warning. The response was a request that he go and prophesy to the people of his own country. Now as we begin the study of the printed text,

Shalmaneser, king of Assyria has come up against Israel. Hoshea, the last of the kings of Israel was ruling, at this time. Though he was less evil than any of the previous kings, of the northern kingdom, the Lord permitted him to be overcome, by the Assyrians. How often we hear some one say I am not so bad or he is not so bad. Hoshea was not so bad as the other kings, but the Lord, after giving him a fair chance, finally allowed the nation to be carried captive.

We next see the reason for this captivity set forth. They "had sinned against the Lord their God, which had brought them up out of the land of Egypt, from under the hand of Pharoah king of Egypt, and had feared other gods." Every Israelite knew well the story of God's deliverance, from Egypt. It had been rehearsed in their ears, year after year. Only an almighty god could smite all the first born of Egypt in one night. Only an almighty god could hold back the waters of the Red Sea. Only an almighty god could cause the discomfiture of the Egyptians, in the midst of the sea. Yet, in the face of all these

great deliverances, for Israel, and all these demonstrations of the power of God, they had feared other gods. They had turned aside to gods of wood and stone, which could neither see nor hear. They had feared gods which were even less powerful than the individuals who made them. For these, Israel had forsaken the true God.

They had been warned from the time of Moses, that God was casting out the inhabitants of the land of Canaan because of these

sins. God had therefore warned them not to seek out how these nations served their gods, lest it become a snare to them, and God be forced to cast them out of the land, as He had done with their predecessors.

The trend, of their thinking is shown in verse nine, where we read; "the children of Israel did secretly those things that were not right against the Lord their God." In their vain imaginations they seemed to think that God could not see nor know the things which they did in secret, though the palmist had said, "thou understandest my thoughts afar off." They were attracted and ensnared by the licentious ritual of worship, which these heathen neighbors observed. It was a ritual so obscene that we may not comment upon it here. They had continued in their sin "until the Lord removed Israel out of his sight, as he had said by all his servants, the prophets." Israel was carried away to Assyria, which means that they were scattered among the lands held in the possession of Assyria, so that their identity has been lost to man.

The last portion, of our printed text, has to do with the part which drunkenness played in the downfall of Israel. Isaiah, that great prophet, calls Ephriam, which is another term for Israel as a kingdom, to take a look at the result of this habit upon the destiny of the nation. He calls attention to their location, at the head of a fat valley. Their land was exceptionally fertile. It was, therefore the envy of the other nations. Isaiah likened it to the first ripe figs. These grew larger and were sweeter than the regular crop. They were eagerly sought for and quickly eaten by those who found them. But, as anything

committed to the care of a drunken guard is certainly in untrustworthy hands, so Isaiah warns Israel that their lands could not long remain secure in the midst of so much drunken revelry.

Drunkenness is one of the fruits of sin in the heart. "Sin is a reproach to any people." Liquor and intemperance, generally, have sped the downfall of all those nations which have forgotten God. Our own nation faces a growing crime list. The government records say that sixty percent of our crime is directly traceable to liquor. It is time that we gave this condition some more serious consideration. "God is no respecter of persons." If He spared not Israel, what reason have we to believe that we shall escape the penalty for our excesses?

Mushrooms and Trilliums

It's May, a wet, rainy May, and even though the farmers down in Holmes County are having a hard time getting their plowing and fitting done, it's a great time for wild flowers and mushrooms. Different sections of the country have their own pet dishes. Maybe it's fried chicken, or baked whitefish or porterhouse steak or maple sirup and pancakes. Down where I was a boy, it's the spring mushroom. Sometimes they call it the "sponge mushroom". Ask anvbody who was raised down there if I'm not telling it straight. First you get the mushroom. That's not so easy as you might think. It takes a good shower followed by a hot sun to bring them out. The small dark ones you find in old orchards. The bigger, light-col-ored ones prefer damp fertile woods and fence rows. You sometimes find them around ash trees. Every fellow has his own secret place to find them. When he finds a good patch, he returns to that same spot year after year when the apple blossoms are white on the trees. Wherever you find them, split them in two, roll them in flour and fry them in butter. The president himself couldn't eat anything more delicious. Ask anybody who ever ate them.

Mushroom time is trillium time down there in Holmes County also, and the wet weather we've had suits this magnificent flower perfectly. There the trillium grows unmolested in patches acres in extent. You can't expect a trillium to grow big and tall and proud when it is starved for food by picking the green leaves along with the flowers as is too often the case around our cities.

Good mushroom and trillium

weather is also good sucker and carp weather. I believe the mushrooms were the biggest attraction down there this past week end. Anyway we got a lot of enjoyment out of it.
