#### LIFE

#### HERE AND HEREAFTER

Can you answer the following four questions?

1. What is life? (Think a min-

ute.)
2. Do you know when Time began? (Think another minute.)

3. Do you know what lies beyond the most distant Star? (Think some more.)

4. And now that we have split the atom, who can tell for certain what constitutes the next division of matter and how it too, may be dismembered?

No answer?

All of this adds up to the fact that with our dull minds and clumsy bodies man is not capable of understanding the Ultimate or the Infinite, but must accept on faith those things that are sometimes considered to be the facts of life.

Life—Time—Space—Matter are evident factors in man's present day existence. But beyond saying

that (1) Life is something that ends with death, or that (2) Time is something measured in seconds, minutes, hours, days, weeks, or years or (3) that Space is a matter of microns, inches, feet, miles or light years and that (4) Matter is made up of molecules, atoms, electrons, etc., it remains a fact that the average individual has little more in the way of an ultimate explanation. He must of necessity turn to a higher mind, a higher power, a higher personality, an Infinite Being, whose name is "God." So:—

1. Who is God?

2. How is God manifest? In God's own Holy Word, the Bible, we have been told:—

1. That, God is a Spirit.

2. That, God was manifest in the flesh through His Son Jesus Christ.

It was this same Jesus Christ who was nailed to a cross where, he suffered and died, paying the penalty for our sins. Furthermore, the third day he overcame that great enemy of all mankind, death;



when he arose and was "seen of Cephas, then of the twelve. After that he was seen of above five hundred brethren at once."

We are also told in this same Book that Jesus lives today, sitting as it were at the right hand of God the Father, where for those who have accepted Him He acts as their advocate. And one day, the promise is, He will come again. It is written "For the Lord himself shall descend from Heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel and with the trump of God; and the dead in Christ shall rise first." (I Th. 4:16.)

The auestion now:-

Are you living in Christ so that you will be one of the multitude in that "Great Day" who will come forth to meet Him at the sound of His voice?

So, now back to our first question:

"What is life?"

The answer:

While there are definitions to be found in the dictionary for the word "life" no one knows the ultimate explanation any more than you know when time began or the location of the boundaries of space and matter.

But this we do know: Dead people have no children after they are

dead. It takes life to beget life. Trees grow from seeds produced by other trees, etc.

Likewise—spiritual life,—eternal life,-the same must come from one who lives. Man dies after a short time upon this earth; his life is temporal. But God lives. He is from everlasting to everlasting. And it is God's plan (we know not why but 'tis true) that thru His living Son, our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, we too may live; for did He not say "I am the resurrection, and the life: he that believeth in me, though he die, yet shall he live: And whosoever liveth and believeth in me shall never die." (John 11:25-26.)

Note the words "LIVETH" and "BELIEVETH."

#### George Bernard Shaw's Testimony To Jesus Christ

George Bernard Shaw has the reputation of being one of the world's most brilliant, living men.

It is always interesting knowing what such a man thinks of Christ.

From The Pulpit, October, 1942, we take the following testimony of George Bernard Shaw to Christ:

Why not give Christianity a trial? The question seems a hopeless one after 2,000 years of resolute adherence to the old cry of 'Not this man but Barabbas.'

Yet it is beginning to look as if Barabbas was a failure, in spite of his strong right hand, his victories, his empires, his millions of money, and his moralities and churches, and political institutions

'This Man' has not been a failure yet; for nobody has ever been sane enough to try His way. But He has had one quaint triumph. Barabbas has stolen his name and taken his cross as a standard. There is sort of compliment in that. There is even a sort of loyalty in it, like that of the brigand, who breaks every law and yet claims to be a patriotic subject of the king who makes them.

We have always had a curious feeling that although we crucified Christ on a stick, he somehow managed to get hold of the right end of it, and that if we were better men we might try His plan.

The moneyed, respectable, capable world has been steadily anti-Christian and Barabbasque since the crucifixion; and the specific doctrine of Jesus has

not in all that time been put into political or general social practice.

I am no more Christian than Pilate was, or you, gentle reader; and yet, like Pilate, I greatly prefer Jesus to Barabbas; and I am ready to admit that after contemplating the world and human nature for nearly sixty years, I see no way out of the world's misery but the way which would have been found by Christ's will if He had undertaken the work of a modern practical statesman.

How true is this statement of Shaw's "'This Man' has not been

a failure yet!"

The Lord Jesus was not a failure in His life. Pilate said: "I, having examined Him before you, have found no fault in this Man touching those things whereof ye accuse Him: no, nor yet Herod: for I sent you to him; and lo, nothing worthy of death is done unto Him." (Luke 23:14-15.)

The penitent thief who had made such a mess of his own life said concerning the Lord Jesus: "This Man hath done nothing amiss." (Luke 23:41.)

The Lord certainly did not fail in His work. The unfailing Word says: "This Man, after He had offered one sacrifice for sins for ever sat down on the right hand of God," (Hebrews 10:12.)

He has not failed anyone who ever came to Him in simple trust-

ing faith.

Have you come? Reverse the world's cry and say: "Not Barabbas, but This Man!" You will then be able to sing:

"Jesus never fails,
Heaven and earth may pass away,
But Jesus never fails!"

Where there is a real desire to meet the problem of the unchurched, God always provides.



#### THIS AND THAT

It is fall, I'd know that this is so even if it hadn't been almost cold enough to frost here this morning. Didn't I see Mr. Noble down at the post office yesterday? Didn't Bill Large call me up tonight to inquire about the rabbit crop up on the hill among the pines at the River Place? Two sure signs that straw hats are out of style for this year and galoshes will soon be in order

Rather a nice summer we had too. Better than the average. We were down at the farm more than usual, and that is always a treat. Of course there were also a few bad spots too. Take the day I decided to fix the cabin roof while I was down there alone. The falling branches had knocked a few little holes in the roof where the big chestnut boards had left open gaps drying. I went upstairs and stuck straws out through the holes so that I could find them when I got up on the roof. Then I got nails, hatchet, pitch and pieces of roof and up the ladder I went. Finding one of the straws, I chose the right patch and start driving nails. One nail, no trouble. Two nails and I get a sharp stab in the end of the nose. An angry buzzing surrounds my face. Hornets! I start slapping them off and forget that I am holding a sharp hatchet in my hand. The blood starts streaming gown my face, and I realize that I have cut a nasty gash in my forehead with the hatchet. I drop my tools and scamper down the ladder. Now I seem to be on fire all over. Welts appear on my skin. Knots rise along the veins of my lower arm. White hives appear on my body almost as large as my hand. I wash my face and hurry up to show Walter and Grace what this hornet sting has done for me. Walter jumps into his car and away we go to the doctor. He dresses the wound on my head and gives me a husky shot in the arm. The hornet had pierced a vein in my nose, sending its poison directly into the blood stream.

Saturday while hunting squirrels I had an experience that I want to share with you. Some of you may remember my story of Myrtle, the Turtle, that I wrote in 1946. I had found the turtle over in the Ruly and carried it home to Woods show Martha and David. Martha was the one who had noticed my initials carved on its back. Then I had spotted the date "1934." We turned Myrtle loose among the leaves over at the cabin, and that was the last we saw of her, in 1946. Now another chapter in Myrtle's life seems to have come to light. I was watching for a squirrel Saturday morning a few rods away from the path where I found Myrtle in 1946. Looking down at my feet I spy a turtle partly covered with leaves. I pull my glasses from my pocket, and what do I see? "J.A.M. 1934." Two one-hundred-acre farms separate this spot from our cabin, but there she is. Neither rocks nor treetops nor stream nor steep hillsides have kept her from coming home. Why did she go back? Maybe she didn't like the grubs and fishing worms over around the cabin. Did she worry about her family or was she just plain homesick. Anyway she didn't look one bit longer or broader than she did that hot day back there in 1934 when I carved my initials and the year while I rested from the toil of cutting chestnut trees. How's that, Mr. Noble?



#### Rightly Dividing the Word of Truth

Being the Sixth of Ten Outline Studies of the More Important Divisions of the Scripture by the Late Dr. C. I. Scofield

### LAW AND GRACE

The most obvious and striking division of the word of truth is that between Law and Grace. Indeed, these contrasting principles characterize the two most important dispensations—the Jewish and Christian.

For the law was given by Moses, but grace and truth came by Jesus

Christ. John 1:17.

It is not, of course, meant that there was no law before Moses, any more than that there was no grace and truth before Jesus Christ. The forbidding to Adam of the fruit of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil (Gen. 2:17) was law, and surely grace was most sweetly manifested in the seeking, by the Lord God, of His sinning creatures, and in His clothing them with coats of skins (Gen. 3:21)—a beautiful type of Christ "made unto us . . righteousness." I Cor. 1:30. Law. in the sense of *some* revelation of God's will, and grace, in the sense of some revelation of God's goodness, has always existed, and to this Scripture abundantly testifies. But "the law" everywhere mentioned in Scripture was given by Moses and from Sinai to Calvary dominates —characterizes, the time; just as grace dominates, or gives its peculiar character to, the dispensation which begins at Calvary, and has its predicted termination in the rapture of the Church.

It is, however, of the most vital moment to observe that Scripture never, in any dispensation mingles these two principles. Law always has a place and work distinct and wholly diverse from that of grace. Law is God prohibiting and requiring; grace is God beseeching and bestowing. Law is a ministry of condemnation; grace, of forgiveness. Law curses; grace redeems from that curse. Law kills; grace makes alive. Law shuts every mouth before God; grace opens every mouth to praise Him. Law puts a great and guilty distance between man and God; grace makes guilty man nigh to God. Law says. "an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth"; grace says, "resist not evil; but whosoever shall smite thee on thy right cheek, turn to him the other also." Law says, "Hate thine enemy"; grace, "Love your enemies, bless them that despitefully use you." Law says, "Do and live"; grace, "believe and live." Law never had a missionary; grace is to be preached to every creature. Law utterly condemns the best man; grace freely justifies the worst. (Luke 23:43; Rom. 5:5; I Tim. 1:15; I Cor. 6:9-11.) Law is a system of probation; grace, of favor. Law stones an adulteress; grace says. "Neither do I condemn thee." Under law the sheep dies for the shepherd; under grace the Shepherd dies

Everywhere the Scriptures present law and grace in sharply contrasted spheres.

The mingling of them in much of the current teaching of the day spoils

both, for law is robbed of its terror and grace of its freeness.

The student should observe that "law," in the New Testament Scriptures, always means the law given by Moses (Rom. 7:23 is the only exception); but sometimes the whole law, moral so-called (or the ten commandments) and ceremonial, is meant; sometimes the commandments only; sometimes the ceremonial law only. Of the first class of passages, Rom. 6:14. Gal. 2:16, and 3:2 are examples. Of the second class, Rom. 3:19 and 7:7-12 are examples. Of the third class. Col. 2:14-17.

It should be remembered, also, that in the ceremonial law are enshrined those marvelous types-the beautiful foreshadowings of the person and work of the Lord Jesus as Priest and Sacrifice, which must ever be the wonder and delight of the spiritually minded. Expressions in the Psalms which would be inexplicable if understood only of the "ministration of death written and engraven in stones" (II Cor. 3:7) are made clear when seen to refer also to the types-those lovely pictures of grace:

But his delight is in the law of the Lord; and in His law doth he medi-

tate day and night. Psa. 1:2.

Let Thy tender mercies come unto me, that I may live: for Thy law is my delight. Psa. 119:77.

O how love I Thy law! it is my meditation all the day. Psalm 119:97.


Three errors have troubled the Church touching the right relations of law and grace:

1. Anthomianism, or the denial of all rule over the lives of believers, the affirmation that, because saved by God's free grace, wholly without merit, men are not required to live holy lives.

They profess that they know God; but in works they deny Him, being abominable, and disobedient, and unto every good work reprobate. Titus 1:16.

For there are certain men crept in unawares, who were before of old ordained to this condemnation, ungodly men, turning the grace of our God into lasciviousness, and denying the only Lord God, and our Lord Jesus Christ, Jude 4.

2. CEREMONIALISM. In its first form, the demand that believers should




observe the Levitical ordinances.

And certain men which came down from Judea taught the brethren, and said, Except ye be circumcised after the manner of Moses, ye cannot be Saved. Acts 15:1.

The modern form of this error is the teaching that Christian ordinances

are essential to salvation.

3. GALATANISM, or the mingling of law and grace—the teaching that justification is partly by grace, partly by law; or, that grace is given to enable

an otherwise helpless sinner to keep the law

Against this error, the most widespread of all, the solemn warnings, the unanswerable logic, the emphatic declaration of the Epistle to the Galatians are God's conclusive answer.

This only would I learn of you, Received ve the Spirit by the works of the law, or by the hearing of faith? Are ye so foolish? having begun in the

Spirit, are ve now made perfect by the flesh? Gal. 3:2, 3.

I marvel that ye are so soon removed from Him that called you into the grace of Christ unto another gospel: which is not another (there could not be another Gospel); but there be some that trouble you, and would pervert the gospel of Christ. But though we, or an angel from heaven, preach any other gospel unto you than that which we have preached unto you. let him be accursed. Gal. 1:6-8

The following may be helpful as an outline of Scripture teaching on this important subject. The moral law only is referred to in the passages cited.

1. WHAT THE LAW IS.

Wherefore the law is holy, and the commandment holy, and just and good. Rom. 7:12.

For we know that the law is spiritual: but I am carnal, sold under sin.

Rom. 7:14.

For I delight in the law of God after the inward man. Rom. 7:22.

But we know that the law is good, if a man use it lawfully. I Tim. 1:8. And the law is not of faith. Gal. 3:12.

THE LAWFUL USE OF THE LAW.

What shall we say then? Is the law sin? God forbid. Nay. I had not known sin, but by the law: for I had not known lust, except the law had said. Thou shalt not covet. Rom. 7:7, see, also, 13.

Therefore by the deeds of the law there shall no flesh be justified in His

sight: for by the law is the knowledge of sin. Rom. 3:20.

Wherefore then serveth the law? It was added because of transgressions.

Gal. 3:19.

Now we know, that what things soever the law saith, it saith to them who are under the law: that every mouth may be stopped, and all the world may become guilty before God. Rom. 3:19.

(Law has but one language-"what things soever." It speaks only to

condemn.)

For as many as are of the works of the law are under the curse: for it is written. Cursed is every one that continueth not in all things which are written in the book of the law to do them. Gal. 3:10.

For whosoever shall keep the whole law, and yet offend in one point, he

is guilty of all. James 2:10.

"The ministration of death, written and engraven in stones." II Cor. 3:7. "The ministration of condemnation." II Cor. 3:9.

For I was alive without the law once: but when the commandment came. sin revived, and I died. Rom. 7:9.

The strength of sin is the law, I Cor. 15:56.

It is evident, then, that God's purpose in giving the law, after the race had existed twenty-five hundred years without it (John 1:17, Gal. 3:17), was to bring to guilty man the knowledge of his sin, first, and then of his utter helplessness in view of God's just requirements. It is purely and only a ministration of condemnation and death.

3. What the Law cannot do.

Therefore by the deeds of the law there shall no flesh be justified in His sight: for by the law is the knowledge of sin. Rom. 3:20.

Knowing that a man is not justified by the works of the law, but by the faith of Jesus Christ, even we have believed in Jesus Christ, that we might be justified by the faith of Christ, and not by the works of the law: for by the

works of the law shall no flesh be justified. Gal. 2:16.

I do not frustrate the grace of God: for if righteousness come by the law,

then Christ is dead in vain. Gal. 2:21.

But that no man is justified by the law in the sight of God. it is evident:

for, The just shall live by faith, Gal. 3:11.

For what the law could not do, in that it was weak through the flesh, God sending His own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh, and for sin, condemned sin in the flesh. Rom. 8:3.

And by Him all that believe are justified from all things. from which ye

could not be justified by the law of Moses. Acts 13:39.

For the law made nothing perfect, but the bringing in of a better hope did; by the which we draw nigh unto God. Heb. 7:19.

4. The Believer is not under the Law.

The 6th of Romans, after declaring the doctrine of the believer's identification with Christ in His death, of which baptism is the symbol (verses 1-10), begins, with verse 11, the declarations of the principles which should govern the walk of the believer—his rule of life. This is the subject of the remaining twelve verses; verse 14 gives the great principle of his deliverance from-not the guilt of sin. that is met by Christ's blood, but—the dominion of sin; his bondage under it.

"For sin shall not have dominion over you: for ye are not under the law,

but under grace."

Lest this should lead to the monstrous Antinomianism of saying that therefore a godly life was not important, the Spirit immediately adds:

What then? Shall we sin, because we are not under the law, but under

grace? God forbid. Rom. 6:15.

Surely every renewed heart answers, Amen, and Amen!

Then the 7th of Romans introduces another principle of deliverance

Wherefore, my brethren, ye also are become dead to the law by the body of Christ; that ye should be married to another, even to Him who is raised from the dead, that we should bring forth fruit unto God. For when we were in the flesh, the motions of sins, which were by the law, did work in our members to bring forth fruit unto death. But now we are delivered from the law, that being dead wherein we were held; that we should serve in newness of spirit, and not in the oldness of the letter. Rom. 7:4-6. (That this does not refer to the ceremonial law, see verse 7.)

For I through the law am dead to the law, that I might live unto God.

But before faith came, we were kept under the law, shut up unto the faith which should afterwards be revealed. Wherefore the law was our school-master to bring us unto Christ, that we might be justified by faith. But after that faith is come, we are no longer under a school-master. Gal. 3:23-25.

But we know that the law is good, if a man use it lawfully, knowing

this, that the law is not made for a righteous man. I Tim. 1:8.9.

5. WHAT IS THE BELIEVER'S RULE OF LIFE?

He that saith he abideth in Him ought himself also so to walk, even as

He walked. I John 2:6.

Hereby perceive we the love of God, because He laid down His life for us: and we ought to lay down our lives for the brethren. I John 3:16.

Dearly beloved, I beseech you as strangers and pilgrims, abstain from

fleshly lusts, which war against the soul. I Pet. 2:11 See, also, verses 12:23. I therefore, the prisoner of the Lord, beseech you that *ye walk worthy of* 

the vocation wherewith ye are called, with all lowliness and meekness, with long-suffering, forbearing one another in love. Eph. 4:1, 2.

Be ye therefore followers of God, as dear children; and walk in love, as

Christ also hath loved us, and hath given Himself for us. Eph. 5:1, 2.

For ye were sometimes darkness, but now are ye light in the Lord: walk as children of light. Eph. 5:8.

See then that ye walk circumspectly, not as fools, but as wise, redeeming

the time, because the days are evil. Eph. 5:15, 16.

This I say then, Walk in the Spirit, and ye shall not fulfil the lust of the flesh. Gal. 5:16.

For I have given you an example, that ye should do as I have done to

If ye keep  $M_Y$  commandments, ye shall abide in My love; even as I have kept My Father's commandments, and abide in His love. John 15:10.

This is  $M_Y$  commandment, that we love one another, as I have loved you.

He that hath  $M_Y$  commandments, and keepeth them, he it is that leveth

Me. John 14:21.

And whatsoever we ask, we receive of Him, because we keep His commandments, and do those things that are pleasing in His sight. And this is His commandment, That we should believe on the name of His Son Jesus Christ, and love one another, as He gave us commandment. I John 3:22, 23.

This is the covenant that I will make with them after those days, saith

the Lord, I will put My laws into their hearts, and in their minds will I

write them. Heb. 10:16.

A beautiful illustration of this principle is seen in mother-love. The law of the commonwealth requires parents to care for their offspring, and denounces penalties for the wilful neglect of them, but the land is full of happy mothers who tenderly care for their children in perfect ignorance of the existence of such a statute. The law is in their hearts.

It is instructive, in this connection, to remember that God's appointed place for the tables of the law was within the ark of the testimony. With them were "the golden pot that had manna, and Aaron's rod that budded" (types, the one of Christ, our wilderness bread, the other of resurrection, and both speaking of grace). while they were covered from sight by the golden mercy-seat upon which was sprinkled the blood of atonement. The eye of God could see His broken law only through the blood that completely vindicated His justice and propitiated His wrath. (Heb. 9:4.5.)

It was reserved to modern nomolaters to wrench these holy and just but deathful tables from underneath the mercy-seat and the atoning blood, and

erect them in Christian churches as the rule of Christian life.

WHAT IS GRACE?

But after that the kindness and love of God our Saviour toward man ap-

peared. Titus 3:4.

That in the ages to come He might shew the exceeding riches of His grace, in His kindness toward us through Christ Jesus. Eph. 2:7.

WHAT IS GOD'S PURPOSE IN GRACE?

For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is

the gift of God: not of works, lest any man should boast. Eph. 2:8.9.

For the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men. teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soherly, righteously, and godly, in this present world; looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ, Tit. 2:11-13.

That, being justified by His grace, we should be made heirs according to

the hope of eternal life. Titus 3:7.

Being justified freely by His grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus. Rom. 3:24.

By whom also we have access by faith into this grace wherein we stand.

And now, brethren, I commend you to God, and to the word of His grace, which is able to build you up, and to give you an inheritance among

all them which are sanctified. Acts 20:32. To the praise of the glory of His grace, wherein He hath made us accepted in the Beloved. In whom we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins, according to the riches of His grace. Eph. 1:6, 7.

Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may

obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need. Heb. 4:16.

How complete, how all-inclusive! Grace saves, justifies, builds up, makes accepted, redeems, forgives, bestows an inheritance, gives standing, provides a throne to which we may come boldly for mercy and help, teaches us how to live, and gives us a blessed hope!

It remains to note that these diverse principles cannot be intermingled.

And if by grace, then is it no more of works: otherwise grace is no more grace. But if it be of works, then is it no more grace: otherwise work is no more work. Rom. 11:6.

Now to him that worketh is the reward not reckoned of grace, but of debt. But to him that worketh not, but believeth on Him that justifieth the ungodly, his faith is counted for righteousness. Rom. 4:4.5. See, also, Gal. 3:16-18; 4:21-31.

Finally:

So then, brethren, we are not children of the bondwoman, but of the free. Gal. 4:31.

For ye are not come unto the mount that might be touched, and that burned with fire, nor unto blackness, and darkness, and tempest, and the sound of a trumpet, and the voice of words; which voice they that heard intreated that the word should not be spoken to them any more: (For they could not endure that which was commanded, And if so much as a beast touch the mountain, it shall be stoned, or thrust through with a dart: And so terrible was the sight, that Moses said, I exceedingly fear and quake:)

But ye are come unto Mount Sion, and unto the city of the living God. the heavenly Jerusalem, and to an innumerable company of angels, to the general assembly and church of the first-born, which are written in heaven. and to God the Judge of all, and to the spirits of just men made perfect, and to Jesus the mediator of the new covenant, and to the blood of sprinkling.

that speaketh better things than that of Abel. Heb. 12:18-24.

It is not, then, a question of dividing what God spoke from Sinai into "Moral" and "Ceremonial"—the believer does not come to that mount at all.

"The believer is now, by faith in the Lord Jesus, shrouded under so perfect and blessed a righteousness, that this thundering law of Mounnt Sinai cannot find the least fault or diminution therein. This is called the righteous-

ness of God without the law."

(Should this meet the eye of an unbeliever, he is affectionately exhorted to accept the true sentence of that holy and just law which he has violated: "For there is no difference: for all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God" (Rom. 3:22, 23), and find perfect and eternal salvation through believing with the heart and confessing with the mouth that Christ who is "the end of the law for righteousness to every one that believeth." Rom 10:4, 8, 9.)
