CIVILIZATION DESERVES TO LIVE

If civilization abides, if it weathers the storms that threaten its very existence, it will overcome because the leaders of humanity and the noble self sacrificing class, have found a common ground on which to unite and carry on. Three achievements are absolutely necessary to the salvation of the race. First, that the world adopt christianity as a workable program for all humankind. Second, that christianity merge and become one mighty force, thus to save itself, and command the respect of all the world. Third, that christianity taps anew the vital life giving force that was, at its beginning and ever has been its privilege.

In a word we reinforce these 1-2-3 points. First, that the world adopt christianity. The world has been up and down many times, the races of men have tried many plans, all have snapped under pressure, all have failed. The super minds of the ancient Greeks or the might and organization of the Romans or the modesty and backwardness of the Hindoo or Chinese, no plan of theirs could save their civilization.

The Emperor of Japan recently declared that christianity was not practical. But pray, tell me, outside of the Great Teacher called Christ, has any human soul ever brought forth a workable plan for all people, in all places and all times.

Christianity must overcome the world or the world's civilization is lost. Second, That christianity merge to save itself and to command the respect of the world. Christianity, divided in itself, is thus weakened. The world cares little today for doctrine, they want life, food, raiment and hope. Mighty agencies are eating away at divided christianity and all religions, eating at its fabric, silently as a moth

eats and destroys a precious garment. Christianity therefore must unite. Merge, that there be one fold, for deadly beasts of prey are abroad in the world. It's as necessary to make friends of each other, to forsake our pet differences for the salvation of christianity as it was for the early settlers to fly to the fort when some scout cried a warning of the Indians. Third, that christianity tap the life giving force, that which is its prerogative and has been from the beginning. Christianity in the long ago was a mighty force, it was vital, it transformed men, they became twice born. I am persuaded that christianity must give evidence of being the salt of the earth and the light of the world and a rock on which to stand.

Christianity, like all other religions, must stand or fall by the acid tests of its worth today.

If salvation means anything worthy the name then it means a new man, a good man, an honest man, a dependable man, a man whose life is richer and nobler and happier because of his resolve. This must be a reality not a theory. This power line of christianity is something amazingly greater than being a Methodist, or Baptist or Presbyterian. It in reality is being a contact man between the Almighty and a burdened race. The world has wearied of brands of confessions and meaningless dogmas. The human race must know, not about your church or mine, but has this great system of christianity any contact from high Heaven to earth, whereby a stranded and confused civilization may find the way of peace and life.

the lessons of the second quarter will be in Genesis. The subjects will treat of Adam, Noah, Abraham, Isaac, Esau, Jacob, and Joseph. These were truly wonderful men and their lives are interesting from both the historical and the religious standpoint. Plan to attend some Bible School each Sunday during this quarter and do not miss any of the connecting links. The manner in which God revealed himself to these men before the plan of salvation to eternal life was declared by Jesus is wonderful. Please remember that these men obeyed God because it was a better way to live in this world and not because they had any hope of eternal life. What a wonderful thought there is in this fact.

Our first lesson teaches us that everything originates from God and further declares this fact by adding details. It also teaches that God is a free, intelligent and a personal being. The existence of man is explained to be a fulfillment of a divine plan whereby he is made in the image of God and is placed on the earth to rule. Man is given dominion over the fowls of the air, the fish of the sea, the vegetation, the forces of mechanics, the mineral kingdom and the animal kingdom. We are to understand that the trinity taught by Jesus was before the foundation of the world. Consequently this part of Genesis, written so many years before the birth of Christ, logically refers to a fact which Jesus verified in conversations with his disciples.





enty-six years of age, who has resided at 1233 East Kent road (corner Kent and Fish Creek Roads), for the past 37 years has a large and remarkable collection of Indian relics and other curios which he has been collecting since he was twelve years old.

The first thing which will catch your eye in the exhibition cabinet is a human skull wearing a pair of shell rim glasses, and with a pipe in its mouth. This skull has been in the family for something like one hundred years. It was unearthed by one of Mr. Brittain's ancestors while making an excavation for a house on top of what was probably a mound builders mound.

He has a large number of flint spear and arrow heads, besides many stone tools and cutting instruments used by the Indians for such purposes as skinning animals, cultivating the ground, grinding corn meal, etc.

Among the Indian relics in Mr. Brittain's collection which have hu-

man interest stories attached are a toma-hawk (Mr. Brittan calls it something else) and a war pipe, which during the early French and Indian wars one of Mr. Brittan's ancestors took from an Indian Runner, who attacked him but was killed in the attempt. Also there are two arrows with shafts attached, one of which passed through the cap and the other through the buck skin jacket (belonging to another ancestor, who was an Indian fighter. Each arrow came from a different Indian and Mr. Brittan tells us this particular ancestor killed each respective Indian who shot the arrow.

Besides Indian relics there are many heirlooms, antiques, etc., in Mr. Brittan's attic which he informs us would take half a day to tell the stories connected with the same.




