OUR PUBLIC SCHOOLS

We are boastful of our great institution, The Public School System, granted that it tops all such systems of all ages. However, I offer my testimony relative to Public Schools, gleaned from experience and observation. I declare the Public School System very faulty, inadequate, a system not keeping step with the demands of the 20th century.

Too many boys in reform schools, too many girls drunk in beer joints, too many youngsters going straight to the devil, too much wild life on the playground.

The educational system is upside down and wrong end to. The school system pumps into the life stream of our youth a heap of Virgil, of Caesar, of Homer, a smattering of mathematics, a lot of dead and useless things, it encourages the rough, the boisterous.

My testimony, after years of experience, is that my public school instruction has meant very little to me through my life. My experiences, my years of study and contact out of school has an inestimable value to me.

My indictment of the Public School System is that it is not producing the fine arts in men and women, it is not teaching integrity, honesty, purity, nobility, chivalry, modesty.

The public schools teach mathematics, geography and spelling,

all that is commendable, but thieves, liars, jail-birds, drunkards, hi-jackers and the whole line of human perverts have all that. Is our crop of young life not to receive training in respect, gentleman-ness and lady-likeness, in morals, in cleanliness of both body and soul?

The young life of this age are the criminal class, the bandits, the outlaws. It's the college crew and the high school group that astonish civilization by rushing through rough shod and ruthlessly trampling down the land-marks of good behavior.

The schools I attended as a boy never put on the wild, reckless frolics they have today. Our school systems are upside down because they fail to teach individually the lessons each individual has a right to learn. Chemists will tell us what a handful of soil will produce, but the individual scholar is not coached along the line of his bent or talent. Again, if the pupil lags, slips or fails he is passed up as stupid or unworthy, when some physical help would push him along to the head of the class.

The world no longer sends Billy to school to be taught to write and figger only, the world demands infinitely more, they expect the school to mold out a citizen. The schools are mighty strong in sports and scholarships, but equally weak in truth and
