for us only that which is justly ours. We never should have been stricken with leprosy. So nine men that day went about their business. Why bother thanking God, reasoned they. We are now only in a normal state of health, just like other men. What we need now is work and the comforts of home. Yes, indeed, said one, we have now come into our own. We are like other people free and happy, possessors of a glorious liberty.

So the average goes, one in nine is grateful for the goodness of God, and nine to one see little, or nothing, for which to be thankful. But Divine Providence still asks a searching question, Where are the nine?

Bible Study Lesson Nov. 16 UNION WITH CHRIST

Golden Text—Abide in me, and I in you. John 15:4.

Union with Christ is symbolized by the grapevine. Nothing could have been more familiar to the people of Palestine than the vine, and Jesus gave this illustration in his usual simple, forceful words that the humblest workman could understand

Christ is the vine and we are the branches. The life that flows through the vine also refreshes the branch, uniting branch, fruit, stem and root into a close union, so that one without the other would be incomplete. We are part of Christ the vine. His power and purity flowing through us brings development, attainment and fulfilment.

Severed from the vine the branch can only shrivel and die. Separated from Jesus the soul can only fall back into spiritual poverty.

Christ is the vine and we are the branches. The sole purpose of the branch is to bear bruit.

How, then, can we bear the fruit which is to be expected? It will never be done without prayer. "Prayer is the branches desiring and demanding the life of the vine in order that they may bear fruit according to the nature and purpose of the vine." G. Campbell Morgan.

TEXT - SERMON

Then said Jesus again unto them, I go my way, and ye shall seek me, and shall die in sins, whither I go ye cannot come. Then said the Jews, will he kill himself? Because he saith, whither I go, ye cannot come. And he said unto them, ye are from beneath; I am from above: ye are of this world: I am not of this world. I said therefore unto you, that ye shall die in your sins: for if ye believe not that I am he, ye shall die in your sins." John 8-21-24

While Rev. Hulme chose to read more of the eighth chapter of John than is quoted above, the four verses as given are sufficient to serve as a text. Characterizing his message as one that was not pleasant to deliver, yet one that is very necessary for a minister to give to his people on occasion, if he is to be true to his calling, Rev. Hulma pointed out that the whole theme of God's judgment and the warnings on Eternal Punishment run like a scarlet threat throughout the Bible.

The words of warning in the text are not those of a priest but are the Master's my own. And the people to whom he spoke professed to be the religious leaders of that day. Many times did Jesus speak in this way. And so if we are to accept Jesus we must accept what he tells us as being true and take heed.


