## Collect Minier Duds at Fix-it Shop

Clothing to replace that lost by the Bill Minier family when their home burned after being struck by an airplane is being collected at Bill Large's Fix-it Shop in the Holt Building.

The clothing collection is essential now because the Miniers lost everything and a furniture collection is planned later when the family move into another house.

Joe Rampi of the Speedee Cleaners in the shopping center has offered to clean donations that fit the family as his contribution to their return to normal living.

A usual Sunday was being enjoyed by the Minier family, Nov. 29, at 12:50 p.m. their home was hit by a plane taking off from the Kent Airport. Explosions followed and the house was completely destroyed by fire. Three of the family escaped with their lives but with nothing else except the clothes they were wearing.

In 1933, Hattie and Bill Minier moved into the Stow area, taking up residence at 4037 Kent Road, a home built in 1885 by Mr. and Mrs. William Swartz Bill's grandparents. Hattie and Bill have four children, Marguerite, 24, Betty Mae, 20, Billy, 22 and Buddy 13. All four children attended Stow schools.

Hattie is now a patient at Akron City Hospital, Room 111 Surgical, with her leg in traction, suffering from a fractured kneecap, injured running from her home.

Mrs. Senta Winslow, 3288 Patty Ann Drive, has lent her a small portable typewriter which she can manage in her hospital bed.

From there she is continuing her work as Stow correspondent for the Kent-Ravenna Record-Courier, a job she has handled since 1953.

Bill had to take a leave of absence from his job at Goodrich, and he too has been at City Hospital for back X-rays. He was thrown to his knees when the plane hit the house. At present Bill is staying with his daughter in Brimfield and Billy Jr, who had just left home minutes before the crash, is now staying with a friend, Gary Garrett, 3571 Dayton St., Stow. He is employed at the Hygenic Dental Mfg. Co. and had been purchasing some item of wearing apparel each payday to build a complete wardrobe and he lost all his clothing in the fire.

Buddy is staying with a classmate, Wayne Anderson, 3759 Baird Road, Stow, and attending classes at Stow High where he is a Freshman.

At the present time clothing is most needed by the family, who are in the process of compiling a list of their loss due to the fire.

Bill and Bill Jr. are both six foot tall and weigh from 170 to 180 pounds. Buddy is about five foot five and wears size sixteen to eighteen in underwear and outer clothing. Hattie wears size 20, 11½ hose, 9½ narrow shoe.

There was no insurance on the house or its furnishings, and when the family once again can be together, items other than clothing will be needed to refurnish a home.

## Town Hall

Stow Village Council guaranteed Stow a "master plan" to guide its future development at the Dec. 3 meeting.

The plan which passed four to two with Grover Shuman and Larry Saltis opposing, calls for a three-phase study by the Tri-County Planning Commission.

The first phase, called Phase A, will cost \$6,600. Council authorized immediate payment of \$1,800 for mapping.

Mrs. Margery Walker of 3539 Edgewood, spokesman for a group of Stow residents, called for the development of a well planned community to do credit to property owners.

"We must not let Stow grow like Topsy," Mrs. Walker said.

Council also passed an ordinance restricting hunting. Only residents are now permitted to hunt on their own property.

## Way Back When

PEGGY GAYLORD STOW

She was the daughter of Johnathon Gaylord and his wife Elizabeth Goodwin.

A little about her parents: Johnathon and Elizabeth were married in Middletown Upper-houses (now Cromwell) Ct. May 9, 1773. That is a very short time before the Revolutionary War began. He was a soldier in that war. His fine military record has been used by many of his female descendants to get them into the Daughters of the Revolution.

He and his wife and all of his family came to Stow in 1809. There were more than 40 in the party.

Most of Johnathon's children were married before that time. Of the eight children, four were twins (two pair of twins). Elizabeth died the year they came - 1809 - her burial is the first recorded in Stow Cemetery. Peggy and her husband, William Stow, were in this party. Six of their children came with them. Four more were born in the log house by the river. They lived there until 1836. Of course by then most of the children had married and gone.

In 1836 an eventful thing happened that effected the lives of Peggy and William Stow. Edmund Munroe, a wealthy man from Boston, came here and tried to start a city. The story is fully told in Summit County histories. William Stow lost \$1,200.00 in that venture. He sold his big farm and moved to Primfield. His son Albert and wife Almira (newly married) went with him. The Stows only stayed

there a short time. It was long enough so that my mother Ellen Stow was born in Brimfield, May 19, 1837. When William and Peggy came back to Stow they bought a farm where the Smorgasbord now stands and lived there the rest of their lives. Several of their children lived near them. Their youngest son, Russell and his family, lived with them and after him, his son George. That is, three generations of Stows lived there. William died in 1853 and Peggy in 1864. She was then more than 90 years old. This lively little woman must have passed on some of her vitality for her son Albert was more than 97 when he died, and I, her great-grandson, will soon be 91.

## arteriosclerosis—major killer

Arteriosclerosis with its main killers—coronary thrombosis (heart attack) and brain thrombosis (stroke)—is by far the leading cause of death in the U.S. and in most other countries of western civilization.

In 1925 disorders of the heart, blood vessels and related organs were recorded as the cause of one-third of all deaths. By 1956 they were responsible for 850,000 deaths—more than half the total number of deaths in this country. Arteriosclerosis refers to various changes in arteries which make them thicker, less elastic, more rigid and possibly with deposit of calcium salts. Degeneration of blood vessels caused by deposit of fatty materials, such as cholesterol, within the inner lining of the wall results in atherosclerosis.

Intensive research in this field has resulted in better understanding of arteriosclerosis. The application of old drugs has improved; new peripheral vasodilators and antihypertensive drugs have been developed;

anticoagulant medication has advanced; knowledge of electrolyte balance and imbalance has increased; and the relation of certain conditions to diet is being investigated. The effect of moderate exercise on vascular walls is now considered beneficial by many medical men.

Predisposing factors to arteriosclerosis heart attack and stroke) are:

1. **Heredity.** Did either of your parents or grandparents suffer from or die at middle age or earlier from these diseases? If so, see your physician.

2. **Overweight.** If you are more than 10 pounds above your desirable weight, see your physician.

3. **Blood cholesterol.** If your serum cholesterol level is higher than normal, your physician should check for arteriosclerosis.

4. **Blood pressure.** Have it checked periodically, by your physician.

5. **Excessive cigarette smoking.** If you smoke too much, see a physician for a complete check.

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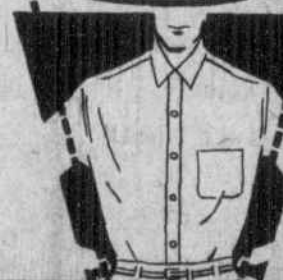


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## CLUB NEWS
