POPULATION EXPLOSION HITS STOW

The number of students in Stow's public school system has approximately doubled in the last seven years, bringing home the worldwide problem of the population explosion.

"Explosive population growth requires planning and planning is control," P.I. Van Brunt, superintendent of schools, declared. "A continuing influx of additional students is creating an emergency status and the need for emergency action."

Stow schools accommodated 270 new students this fall, and if this rate of growth continues it will require a full new school building every two years, he said.

Van Brunt made a report on the crowded schools to the village council in session to consider Tri-County Planning services.

Stow school enrollment stayed at a stable level of about 1,200 from the 1930's through 1947 and then started a steady climb.

When Van Brunt joined the school system in 1953 the net enrollment stood at 1,650 and by September, 1959 it had reached 3,012. There was a downward fluctuation allowing for dropouts to 3,004 in October but 26 additional students in the month of November alone brought the roster to a high of 3,030 students.

Twenty-six students is the equivalent of one school room.

Van Brunt pointed out that national population statistics show an average of one school age child per household and that there are some 2,000 homes in new allotments built here in recent years.

With large tracts of land still undeveloped in Stow it is predictable that more allotments

Stow now has an enrollment of 1,240 in the high school. The three elementary schools, are Highland with 550 students, Woodland, 660, and Riverview, 580.

The new Lakeview Elementary, scheduled to be finished in 1960, will accommodate some 360 students.

Stow Couple Brings Magic To Parties

When you ask George Kirkendall and his wife Shirley, "How's tricks?" it's no passing whimsical remark.

The 28-year-old Stow couple, who perform under the stage names George Kendall and Shirley take trickery in dead earnest.

George has been performing as a magician before club and church groups and in supper clubs for 10 years. He taught his wife many of the illusions of sleight-of-hand to add to her strawberry blonde attraction as the prettier half of the husband-wife team.

He worked his way through the University of Akron as a magician and now is employed by Hottle and Associates, an Akron custom drafting firm.

"We perform for children's as well as adult parties," George said. "In fact it was childhood curiosity that led me to magic. I started learning magic acts when I was nine and I let that curiosity grow."

"My favorite routine is working the silks, manipulating handkerchiefs, although we pull rabbits out of hats and have a wide variety of other illusions, including liquid tricks which involve making glasses of water appear and vanish. I'm working on plans to build equipment for sawing my wife in two."

"The best evidence that the hand is quicker than the eye is the fact that you see more black eyes than bruised knuckles," the magician said.

He collected much of his magic apparatus in 1950 at Abbot's Magic Studio, a large

equipment factory in Colon, Mich.

He has played engagements at a square dance at St. Stephen's Lutheran Church in Stow, the Mayflower Terrace Room and Iacomini's in Akron, the Smorgasbord and private parties.

The Kirkendalls live at 3545 Williamson Rd., Stow.

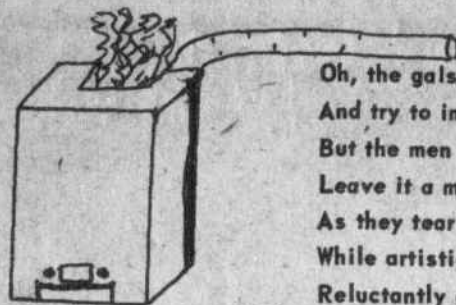

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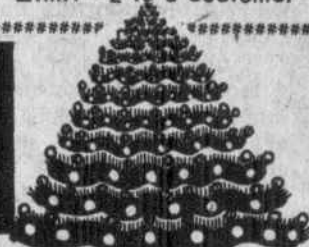

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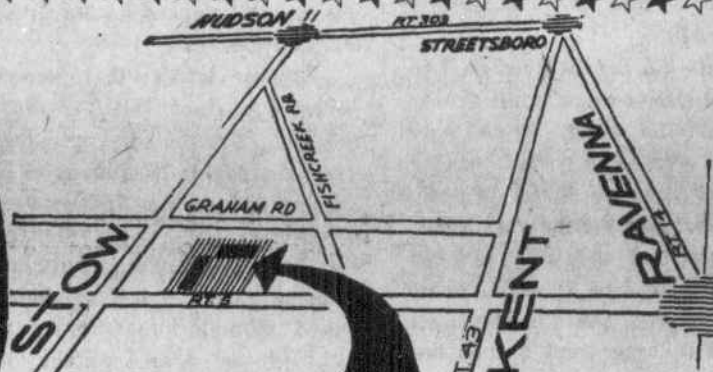
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Way Back When

Dear people — a word of identification before I start this tale. For a long time I have been peddling stories about my neighbors' families here in Stow. My memory goes back quite a ways. I think it is part of my heritage and I gladly share it with you.

As boy and man I knew Mr. Chamberlain well. He died in 1899, 78 years ago. He was not a native of Stow but had lived here many years. His home was the big old-fashioned house on North Darrow Road where E. A. Gleason has lived for some time. Number 4160. Mr. Chamberlain did not build the house.



It was the home of Charles Powers, a son of Gregory (another of Stow's immortals). I think Charles built it more than 125 years ago. Newman married Sophronia Stark. She was one of Benjamin and Hannah Stark's nice girls.

This big family lived next to the Williamsons on Fish Creek-Darrowville Road. Their only child, Frederick, was born in 1851. It is likely that they came to their home near this time. The farm on the west side of the highway had 80 acres in it. Besides this the Chamberlains owned a large tract across the highway between Darrow and Stow. They were very well-to-do.

All of the Starks were members of the Disciple Church as was Newman himself. He was a big, muscular man, a shrewd and

thrifty farmer and a very hard worker. Like many of his neighbors in the church he was a Bible student. He had a magnificent voice. He loved to sing and pray, too. The trait that caused a lot of quiet amusement among his Yankee neighbors was that he sang at the top of his voice when he drove around town. He and Sophronia prayed fervently and often, I have reason to know. At a prayer meeting at the parsonage one evening Mr. Chamberlain and then Mrs. Chamberlain prayed. Both were emotional and said, "Hallelujah" or "Glory to God" and finally I snickered out loud but was not punished for it by my preacher Dad.

Another story that shows Newman's great faith in God. His son, Fred, was very sick. The father and mother were praying for him but he was getting worse. Their friends begged them to get a doctor but they refused. Some of his neighbors asked my father (a minister) to talk to the man. Father, of course, knew him well and talked for some time to him. At last Mr. Chamberlain got mad and said, "Frank, we run our own shebang." They finally called a doctor and the boy got well.

A tall, massive, granite monument stands on the Chamberlain lot in Stow Cemetery. This solemn warning covers much of the face of it: "Reader art thou born again? No salvation without a new birth. As the waters of Noah's Flood covered all the earth and hid the highest hills so Christ's blood covers and hides all our sins."

Newman was certainly very emotional but never crazy.

Lindemann averaged 206 and Nancy Sailer, 125, against their opponents, Sharlene Emrick with 155 and Jim Sailer, also 155.

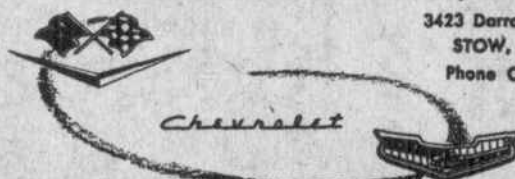
Mrs. Emrick won her chance to bowl in the exhibition by rolling high score in a roll-off among all women league bowlers with an average of 132 or better at the lanes.
