Way Back When

I came to Stow Township about 85 years ago. I was born in Canfield. (Note: When I shuffle off, it will so annoy me if it is reported that I was a native of Stow that I may rise up and protest!)

I only remember two colored persons living in the township that I knew well. The stories I have told about them to my children and friends are threadbare, but of course new to most of those who live here now. Both of these persons were men.

Albert Williams was near my father's age. He had been a slave somewhere in the deep south. He was a friendly, ignorant man who cheerfully did what he was asked to do as well as he could do it. He was our hired man for several years. He slept in the barn, but ate with us. He was neat and clean.

I was 5 or 6 years old and a very smart but simple-minded boy. Albert was a hearty eater and loved the Johnny Cake my mother often made. She made it in what we called dripping pans. I think

in size. For a meal for all of them they were about 10 by 16 inches. She filled two of them, one for the family; that is, Grandpa and Grandma, Mother, sometimes Father (he was often away), four girls and me. And one for Albert.

He really gorged himself. When he got up from the table, he had to hang on to himself!

Sometimes after supper he stayed for a short time in the house. Frank (me) soon went to bed. Before I went to bed, I kissed the whole circle. One of my big sisters jokingly said, "Frank, aren't you going to kiss Albert?"

Albert said, "Oh, he won't kiss this ole black man." I gave him a good smack.

He never forgot. He would buy stick candy for me - striped, peppermint flavored.

A friend for me is a friend, regardless of race, color, or of previous servitude.

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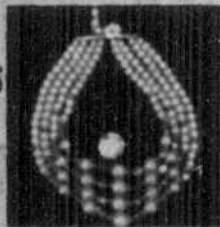
