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



COMMISSION SAYS Postmans Dilemma OPEN ROSE BLVD.

Stow Board of Education's letter asking that Rose Blvd. be opened for through traffic beside Lakeview School was recommended for Council approval at Planning Commission's June 29 meeting. This approval would mean school busses for Lakeview and Highland School could use different routes, precluding congestion of children from both schools. It also would ease parking for football

The Commission also recommended approval of the Hibbard Allotment on Hudson Dr., but conditionally. They ask that five centrally located acres in the allotment be put aside for recreation; changes in street pattern to limit access to Hudson Dr.; and widening of Hudson Dr. Their choice of recreation area comes from advice of Tri-County Planning Commission, who felt a formerly proposed area not properly located. Commission also wishes a strip adjacent to Industrial Park rezoned for industry.

However, they recommended that Council allow-the allotment to be apportioned according to zoning laws in effect when it was first proposed, rather than the revised laws. This would allow smaller lot size within the allotment than under new regulations.

Way Back When

Schools In Early Stow (3rd part)

The Williamson No. 5 District: I know little of its early teachers. My Uncle, Wallace Green, was one of them. When we Green children lived at the Stow Farm (Grandpa Stow's) we had to go to the No. 5 School because the Stow Farm was in that district. After Father built our house we came to No. 3 at the Corners. Little Ireland, as



the northwestern comer was called, had No. 7. The school house stood close to the Presbyterian Church. I can't name any of its early teachers. children Some

from Hudson Township attended this Stow School. That is it was a Union District. Perhaps John Hibbard is able to tell some of its early history.

The No. 8 was in the Gilbert The school house District: stood on the north side of Graham Road, a short distance east of Hudson Dr. The Orrin Gilbert home stood for many years on the northwest corner of Graham and Hudson. A filling station is there now (1960). The district embraced all of Bart's Pond and a little of Stow Pond.

No. 2 District: This was in southwest comer of Stow. was a Union District with Tallmadge. Perhaps the school was in Tallmadge. This comer of Tallmadge was very Welsh and I know nothing of its teachers.

No. 6 District: This was the Darrowstreet District. It was a Union District with Hudson Township. I think most of the school children came from Stow. I can't name any of the early teachers but Frank Green taught that school in the fall of 1889 and the winter and spring terms

Bud Ruch OV8-8187 of 1890. I collected 1/2 of my pay, \$26.662/3 monthly from Stow and 1/2 from Hudson. It was a nice school and the experience I got was very useful. I was just out of high school.

I find no mention of a No. 9 or No. 11 School district.

No. 10, No. 12, No. 14 and No. 15: These were small districts which were organized later than others and taken from them.

I have spoken of a No. 6 district taken from 4 townships. The number came from Streetsboro. The section taken from Stow was the Stewart district. I have said this school was the first in town I believe. Its school house is still there. It is the only one still left in town. It is now the meeting place of one of the churches of Stow.

The school at Darrowstreet must have started very early. I think its first teacher was Mary Cannon. The history of this young woman is interesting. She was bom in Mass. in 1788. She had taught in her home town of Aurora and it must have been before 1808 that she taught on the street. Josiah Starr married her December 15, 1808.

These records and some history were given me by Howard Call, Mary's great great grandson. Sometime ago when I was writing about the Starr family. Nuff sed

Health for All

Down, But Not Out

"Tuberculosis? I didn't think people got that any more. been wiped out, hasn't it?"

That's something we've heard a number of times and we wish it were true, but it isn't. Each year there are a few less deaths than the year before. But ...

Right now, 36 million Americans are infected with TB. Based on what is happening today, it is estimated that some 156,000 of these infected people will break down with active tuberculosis sometime during the next four or five years.

These are by no means all long-standing infections. People are picking up the germs today. There are, for instance, more than 2 million young under 25 among those infected. Nearly 20 percent of all new active cases of TB each year are people under 25. Fortunately, with early detection and modern treatment, the death rate in this age group is comparatively low. But young people do still die of TB every year.

Tuberculosis is very much of problem today, especially since it is an infectious disease Any person who is infected with TB can break down with active disease at any time and become a source of new infections far into the future.

No. TB is not wiped out, yet. We hope it will be, in time. Meanwhile it's smart to get a TB check-up every year.
