This section states that when a building or structure is liable to fire because of need of repairs, or age, or dilapidated condition, and when it endangers adjacent properties or its own occupants, the fire prevention inspector shall have the power to order such conditions repaired or removed.

SCUBA Team Recover's 'Body

A headless, lifesize dummy planted in the depths of Crystal Lake by Stow firemen Aug. 5 hardly got waterlogged as the firemen's body recovery team brought it to the surface after a short search.

This was a drill in using Self Contained Underwater Breathing Apparatus (SCUBA) to recover drowned bodies. b

It took only 31 minutes from the time Firemen David Dally, David McMillan and Russ Savage received a call at the firehouse that a person had jumped off Crystal Lake diving board and had not been seen again, until they recovered the "body."

This included time spent driving to the area, donning their SCUBA gear and making the search.

Fireman Dally found the body floating beneath the water's surface 65 ft. from the end of the diving board. Before this the three men had been swimming under the water making nine foot sweeps across a 35 ft. area where the body should have been.

Savage pointed out that a drowned body will normally stay on the bottom, and be within 35 feet of where it entered the water. But the dummy drifted away from where it had been planted.


Football Parking OK'D Despite Closed Rose Ave.


Rotary Club Listens;



ments concerning special inter-ests. No one in this body has any interest other than what's best for Stow."

Industry isn't interested in this section of land, Rapaport contended, because a one foot "spite strip" along its southerm border cuts it off from road frontage. He also claimed that the land, which lent itself to being residential, would be ruined if rezoned for industry.

When Rapaport asked Council why they insisted on rezoning the land for industry, Shuman replied it was generally agreed Stow doesn't have sufficient industrial "The question is, should area. we acquire it in a remote area or expand where we already are,"

Shuman said. "This was only the first read-ing of this zoning amendment and has no legal significance," Shu-man added. "It merely places it before the public."

The matter was referred to Planning Commission and will have a public hearing at 7:30, Sept. 8 in Village Hall.

teenagers and two adults have completed difficult courses of Junior and Senior Life Saving at Silver Springs Park, Inc.

The eighteen-hour course was directed by Margaret Richard life guard and Red Cross Instructor, and her assistant John Redfern instructor in water safety.

One of the requirements in basic survival skills is: The candidate enters the water fully clothed, disrobes and inflates his clothing for buoyancy. Other requirements include include swimming a minimum distance of 440 yds. and having ability to float without moving arms or legs -- or a minimum movement of arms and legs for one minute. Candidates must dive from the waters surface to a minimum depth of six ft. and swim two body lengths under water. They are also expected to tread water for one minute and do a good standing front dive.
