

# Council Hits Fire Hazards

Irate citizens concerned over the unsightly and fire hazardous areas in Stow may find these particular areas cleaned up soon.

Council, at their Aug. 4 meeting, discussed the situation at the intersection of Lillian Rd. and Rt. 91. Here, there are two house trailers, one with a shack type dwelling attached, one vacant house and a small frame building where church services are being held. The residence of George Good on Echo Rd. was also discussed. Councilman Lawrence Saltis said Council was being too "lenient" with the owners of these properties. "Mr. Hale (Joseph Hale, Building and Zoning and Public Service Director) should go to see them once, possibly twice and then someone

ought to be clipped," Saltis said. Fire Chief Ralph Saxe has been issued legal forms to serve on these property owners ordering them to remedy or remove all hazards on their property. Council pointed out that this action is in compliance with Ordinance 1960-48 which establishes the Department of Fire Prevention. In particular they stressed section IV, paragraph 3 of the ordinance.

This section states that when a building or structure is liable to fire because of need of repairs, or age, or dilapidated condition, and when it endangers adjacent properties or its own occupants, the fire prevention inspector shall have the power to order such conditions repaired or removed.

## Rezoning Invokes Protest

Ex-Councilman Lorin Hibbard and Jack Rapaport, agent for the Grant-Holladay Construction Co. of Canton, protested a move to rezone 16.5 acres of Hibbard farm land from residential to industrial use at Council's Aug. 4 meeting.

Hibbard brought an armful of maps to the meeting with which he explained his position to Council. He pointed out that rezoning would lower the value of his land "tremendously."

"We can't stand the loss, and

if we can't, certainly Grant-Holladay can't," Hibbard said.

Rapaport told Council the Grant-Holladay Co. has been trying to gain approval for housing development plans it has for that area for over a year. "We cannot prolong this any longer," he said, and indicated court action may result if Council persists in their rezoning attempts.

Rapaport pointed out several times that he wasn't threatening Council. "...but in view of this case's history I'm asking you to withdraw that bill. If this cannot be harmoniously resolved, or you persist in rezoning, I will recommend to Grant-Holladay that they instigate whatever action is necessary."

Rapaport indicated that a rezoning move was difficult to understand saying, "At this point it is either a special interest or a special pressure that is trying to reclassify this land," he said.

Council President Grover Shuman retorted, "I resent your state-

## Dummy Didn't Stay Put

## SCUBA Team Recovers 'Body'

A headless, lifesize dummy planted in the depths of Crystal Lake by Stow firemen Aug. 5 hardly got waterlogged as the firemen's body recovery team brought it to the surface after a short search.

This was a drill in using Self Contained Underwater Breathing Apparatus (SCUBA) to recover drowned bodies. b

It took only 31 minutes from the time Firemen David Dally, David McMillan and Russ Savage received a call at the firehouse that a person had jumped off Crystal Lake diving board and had not been seen again, until they recovered the "body."

This included time spent driving to the area, donning their SCUBA gear and making the

search.

Fireman Dally found the body floating beneath the water's surface 65 ft. from the end of the diving board. Before this the three men had been swimming under the water making nine foot sweeps across a 35 ft. area where the body should have been.

Savage pointed out that a drowned body will normally stay on the bottom, and be within 35 feet of where it entered the water. But the dummy drifted away from where it had been placed.

ments concerning special interests. No one in this body has any interest other than what's best for Stow."

Industry isn't interested in this section of land, Rapaport contended, because a one foot "spite strip" along its southern border cuts it off from road frontage. He also claimed that the land, which lent itself to being residential, would be ruined if rezoned for industry.

When Rapaport asked Council why they insisted on rezoning the land for industry, Shuman replied it was generally agreed Stow doesn't have sufficient industrial area. "The question is, should we acquire it in a remote area or expand where we already are," Shuman said.

"This was only the first reading of this zoning amendment and has no legal significance," Shuman added. "It merely places it before the public."

The matter was referred to Planning Commission and will have a public hearing at 7:30, Sept. 8 in Village Hall.

Council adopted a new platting ordinance establishing rules, regulations and standards and specifications for the subdivision of lands after a public hearing August 4.

This nullifies the old platting ordinance.

# Master Lifesaving Method

August 11, 1960

Eight teenagers and two adults have completed difficult courses of Junior and Senior Life Saving at Silver Springs Park, Inc.

The eighteen-hour course was directed by Margaret Richard life guard and Red Cross Instructor, and her assistant John Redfern instructor in water safety.

One of the requirements in basic survival skills is: The candidate enters the water fully clothed, disrobes and inflates his clothing for buoyancy. Other requirements include swimming a minimum distance of 440 yds. and having ability to float without moving arms or legs -- or a minimum movement of arms and legs for one minute. Candidates must dive from the waters surface to a minimum depth of six ft. and swim two body lengths under water. They are also expected to tread water for one minute and do a good standing front dive.

In addition, each student masters boat rescue, and reaching, wading, and extension rescues. Artificial respiration, including the back pressure-arm lift and mouth-to-mouth breathing, must

also be demonstrated to the instructors satisfaction.

Approaches, carries, defenses and releases in water rescue must also be performed satisfactorily.

The Life Saving courses are free to persons over 12 for Junior and 16 for Senior at Silver Springs Park if they hold a season swimming membership.
