Mrs. Smeltzer, according to Captain Harper, is the mother of four daughters. One, 14, was used to cash the check in Stow. Varying descriptions of the woman made solution of her identity difficult, though helpful when officers realized there must be more than one woman. Descriptions placed her age from 22 to 45, but handwriting was checked from the daughter's school, revealed that the daughter had written some of the checks, leading to the fact that mother or daughter fit all descriptions.

Mrs. Smeltzer is now under indictment by the Medina County Grand Jury. The other counties' charges against her will probably be included in her trial there.

The daughter was not held. Police are convinced she only followed her mother's instructions. The father of the family, an employee of the Nickle Plate Railway, was ignorant of the whole operation, and has no idea where the money obtained through the forged checks was used, according to the police.

Bowling Lanes Burgled

Sometime between the hours of 1 and 5 a.m. Monday, Sept. 26, burglars entered Sto-Kent Lanes 3870 Fish Creek Rd., via the kitchen door, pried open the manager's office, knocked the dials off the safe and made off with approximately \$1,000.

Manager of the lanes, James Sailer, also a Stow special policeman, commented on the fact that a number of bowling lanes have been robbed recently.

Captain Ronald Harper of Stow police, said the theft had all the earmarks of a professional job.

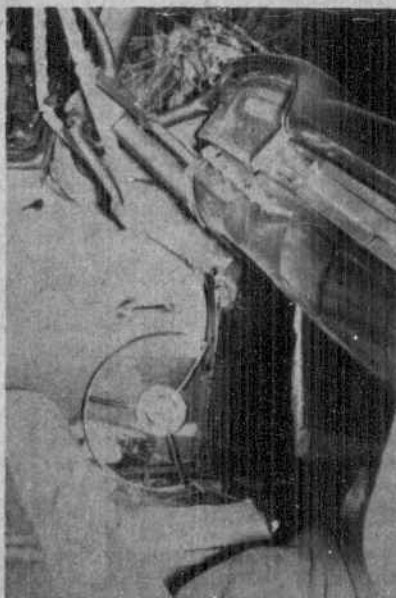

"Serious" is the condition of William E. Jones, 39, hospitalized at City Hospital, after the car he was driving Sept. 25 collided with a cement culvert on Hudson Dr. just north of Commerce Dr.

Way Back When

I have not the date when the Grahams acquired their land, but Henry, the oldest son, was 31 years old in 1865 and married to his 1st wife, Bina Morris. This house was their home for many years and when he moved to the Falls he rented the farm first to Allison Wetmore, then to

He refused to contribute his share in the tax that was levied. He had a son subject to the draft. He said he would defend his property if an attempt was made to collect from him. This was open defiance of the law.

When men were sent to his place to levy on his property he met them and shot two of them down. He was wounded in the fight and had to surrender. After several years in the penitentiary he was pardoned and came back to his farm. More than 1500 citizens of Summit County signed the petition for his pardon.

He lived for several years after that. I have heard many stories about Captain Graham. He was called that because he was in the militia for some time. Most of them, no doubt, are true. I will tell only two.

He kept many hogs in a yard. The slop he fed to them in a long trough had to be lifted over the fence. The hogs tried to crowd into the trough. He had a heavy club and made them stand back until the feed was in the trough. They squealed so they could be heard for a mile. (I believe this story. Any self-respecting hog would do that.)

I can vouch for the other story. Mr. Graham raised many bushels of peaches. He marketed them in the towns around us. He had a sorrel horse - Jack - and a long seated spring wagon. He put his peaches in tobacco pails. When he drove by our place on his way to Kent he would stop and give us Green kids peaches.

This completes what I will tell of the Graham people. A little more about the houses they built and the people who have lived in them. My best judgement is that the William and Maxwell houses were not built before 1830. They look like Joseph Butler houses. He was the builder of many of the houses built years ago here in Stow. He was born in 1807 and is buried in our cemetery. In 1830 he was 23 years old.

Young Will Graham lived with his mother until she died in 1895. Since then the house has had several tenants. I knew some of them. There are many nice homes scattered over the Graham acres. Mr. and Mrs. Robert Jarmusch have lived for a short time in the William Graham

his son, Charles, and then to Zack Thomas. Charlie Beckwith bought this place of the Grahams and I also bought mine from Henry in 1908. Part of my place came from a 20 acre apple orchard that Henry planted. An odd feature in the planting of this orchard was that the trees were staggered in diamond shape rows to get more trees in the same space. Most of the apple trees are gone. This land is now the Partridge bird sanctuary. Pheasants are nesting there and running around town. It is against the law to shoot them in the city.

Henry B. Graham was a friendly intelligent farmer. He did little hard work. His farm land was laid out in long narrow lots easy to cultivate. He always had a hired man. He was twice married. He had one boy from his second wife, named for himself, Henry B. or HB to distinguish him from his father. He has lived in the Falls for a long time. A very well liked man. He has no children, so is the last of the Grahams.

The other son of William, Young Will or Billy as we called him, lived in his father's house for some time after his parents died. He was a fine looking man and made friends easily. It was natural for him to go into politics. All of the Grahams were Democrats. He was elected County auditor and served for some time in that office.

The story was fully told by Samuel Lane in the history he wrote. Anyone can read it in our library. Here are the bare facts: For some reason, Mr. Graham, all through the Civil War was bitterly opposed to it.

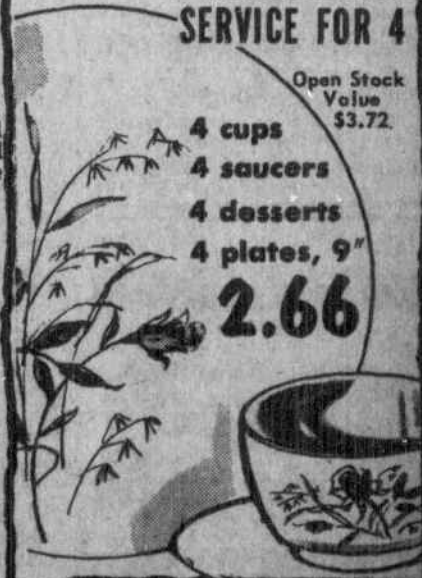

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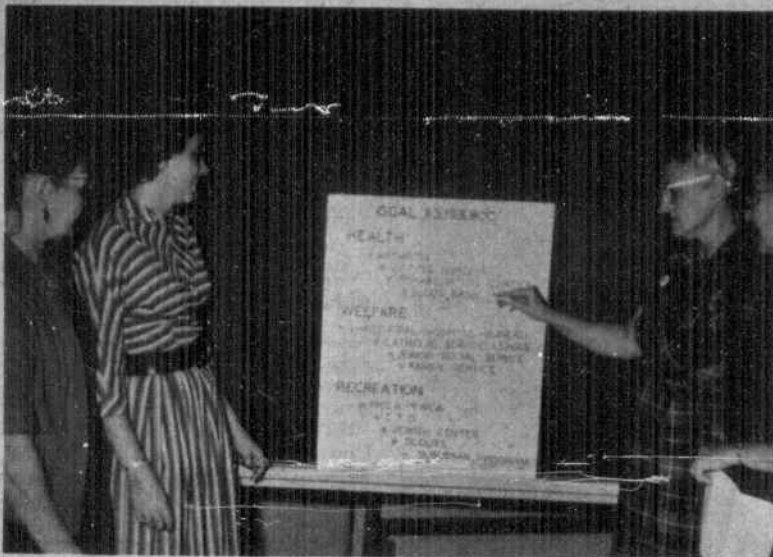
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U.F. Womens Crusaders Get Instructions At Meeting
